Introduction to Port City Futures

The conference is dedicated to the manifold relations between cities and ports. Historically, ports and cities have engaged with major transformations in interconnected ways – ways that will continue to play a role in the future: A strong port city culture can help resolve spatial development questions generated by contemporary urgencies, such as the energy transition, climate change, new technologies, transformations of work conditions so that the port and city (and region) can jointly evolve in a limited space.

This conference brings together port, city, and regional stakeholders and academics from various port cities to compare their experience with Rotterdam. It aims to stimulate discussions between participants on port city relationships by looking at the past and learning from it, identifying contemporary problems and creating future opportunities, identifying and connecting and involving main stakeholders identifying specific different political, economic, social, cultural settings.

During the conference we will engage in presentations, workshops, excursions, round tables, which will eventually lead to a research agenda for port cities



Museum Rotterdam

Museum Rotterdam was founded in 1905 as Museum of Antiquities, by a bourgeois elite that wanted to educate Rotterdam's growing working class population, attracted by the development of the transit port.

It later became the Historical Museum of Rotterdam that glorified Rotterdam's Golden Age in a time that the modern city centre lacked its previous historical references due to its destruction in the bombardment of 1940.

In recent years the museum has changed its aims and ambitions again. The contemporary transnational city, and not the past city, has become central to its museum policies. In 2010 it dropped the 'Historical' in its name to continue as Museum Rotterdam.

Begin 2016 the museum opened a new main location in the historical heart of Rotterdam, adjacent to City Hall. Here the story of Rotterdam, the city with a young heart and an old soul, is told in new ways

Maritime Museum Rotterdam

The Maritime Museum in Rotterdam was founded in 1874 and brings the rich Dutch maritime history to life in contemporary exhibitions and experiences. The Museum organizes activities for a wide target group consisting of three generations: children, their parents and their grandparents. The latest showcase is the Offshore Experience, which places this Dutch high tech maritime industry in the heart(s) of the city and citizens.

'Masterpieces' by the Maritime Museum is showcasing twenty-five unique objects from its centuries-old collection. Each object has earned its place in the exhibition in its own special way – because of its revolutionary role in shipping, because it is a silent witness to a key moment in maritime history, or simply because it is such a high-quality piece.

Schielandhuis

Packed in between neighbouring skyscrapers, this historic icon was established in 1665 by Dutch Water Authority which looked after the water levels in the city and region. The municipality of Rotterdam acquired the premises in 1840 and was home to the collection of the art collector Boymans. A fierce fire caused a lot of damage to historic documents, art and 17th century interior. It was brought back in original style in phases and was again home to Museum Boymans and Museum Rotterdam.

Miraculously, Schielandhuis survived the bombardments in WWII. After it was unused for some time, Rotterdam Partners and Rotterdam Tourist Information welcome citizens, tourists, companies and foreign investors to this unique home of the city.


